Working within "OASIS" (Organization for the Advancement of Structured Information Standards), the LegalXML Electronic Court Filing Technical Committee, made up of volunteers from courts, vendors, and academia, among other industries, developed the ECF 3.1 specification for court e-filing systems.

LegalXML specifications are reviewed by the Joint Technology Committee of COSCA (Conference of State Court Administrators) and NACM (National Association for Court Management).

When approved, they become recommended standards" for e-filing in state courts.
